Helen D. Groome Beatty Trust Donates \$20,000 to Create a PAES® Lab

KSI's efforts to implement a new system for more effectively assessing participants' skills and matching those skills with careers in which those individuals can thrive got a huge boost. The Helen D. Groome Beatty Trust granted KSI \$20,000 to help set up a PAES® Lab at KSI to further enhance the organization's employment readiness programs. The grant sets KSI halfway to the approximate \$40,000 goal needed to implement the program.

A PAES® Lab (Practical Assessment Exploration System) involves hands-on, simulated workplaces designed for participants with disabilities. The system is structured to help individuals explore various jobs, assist service providers in assessing individuals' career potential, and develop essential work skills. The focus is on five career paths—Business/Marketing, Computer/Technology, Construction/Industrial, Processing/Production, and

Consumer/Service. Participants work through hundreds of life and work skills exercises with increasing difficulty. All the while, they’re building independence and identifying strengths for transitioning to independent employment. The goal of PAES® is to determine what an individual can do on their own as independently as possible.

The new system will create a more standardized foundation for assessing individual skills and career interests. The system entails PAES® Lab workstations and curriculum kits for each of the five career focuses. KSI will also have PAES®-dedicated computer stations equipped with assessment software and performance data tracking modules to measure individuals’ progress.



As part of the PAES® system, hundreds of demonstration activities highlighting five career paths will help participants and KSI staff better assess career choices.

KSI Surpasses United Way Goal — CEO Takes the Pie

Wolfington Body Company Donates 14-Passenger Shuttle Bus to KSI

In December, Milford business Wolfington Body Company informed KSI that it was donating a 2024 Ford E-450 Shuttle Glaval Bus to support KSI's transportation fleet. Valued at \$114,692, the bus accommodates 12 seated passengers and two wheelchair transports.

Wolfington annually provides charitable contributions to service organizations, including vehicle donations. According to Wolfington's Milford Sales Manager Stephanie Hoffmeier, the company was looking for a local nonprofit that would utilize a low-mileage bus to benefit deserving communities. An inquiry to the Delaware Department of Education targeted KSI as an ideal organization to make use of a high-quality transport.

Prior to that, she was a Family Support Specialist with the State of Delaware providing, coordinating, and monitoring the delivery of professional social work services to children, youth, and families.

KSI Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Report

It's always illuminating to take a look back over the past year and seeing KSI's progress.

Financially, a positive story told by the numbers was a 10% rise in operating revenue between FY24 and FY25. The rise of \$878,205 had to do with a few factors. The dominant income source of Government Agency Fees and grants rose 21%, reflecting two things. One was the implementation of funding for rate increases moving forward from the FY23 State budget due to the McNesby Act. The other was concerted efforts of the operations team in recruiting, onboarding, and accommodating new program participants. Also worth noting in FY25's stats is that expenses were controlled to the point that costs of operations only increased 4% from the previous year, and were far outpaced by the increase in income.

Organizationally, 2025 was an eventful year for KSI. In the fall, we unveiled the completed redesign and renovation of the Milford Skill Development Center's central section. The latest leg of this master renovation project included a new training center for the Pre-Vocational program that provides an education-style environment to better facilitate participants' benefit from the lessons provided

to them. It also included a new Life Skills Center, including a mock "home" set up with kitchen, laundry, and other daily living spaces. The center will be used to help participants transitioning to independent living gain many of the skills necessary to thrive in that environment.

community members understand the nature of KSI's mission more readily at a glance and make the facility more inviting and personal. Along with replacement of the center's roof, the completion of renovations will require KSI to engage with a wider array of funding partners. That engagement will come in

We're in the process of refining concept plans that will reshape the north wing of the Milford center. Part of those plans envision an interior space that is flexible and modular enough to accommodate both training activities and paid production work that is part of participants' work skills development. Additionally, the Milford center's exterior will get a make-over that will help

many ways, including a comprehensive capital campaign and personal meetings.

Moving forward into FY26, we're looking at different ways to deliver vital programs and enrich participants lives. Something that has already begun is a deepening alignment with the Special Olympics, thanks to the leadership of Dr. Kris Failing, Director of Mission

Advancement. Special Olympics is already a big part of a lot of our participants' lives, with many of them competing in various sports and some even going to the national games in 2026. KSI events, like walking challenges during the summer training season and a Polar Bear Plunge day showing support for the Special Olympics athlete fundraiser, are becoming part of regular life at the Milford center. Dr. Failing has also initiated weekly basketball skills and training classes with help from Special Olympic trainers.

Instituting a PAES® Lab (Practical Assessment Exploration System) as part of participants' Pre-Vocational assessment process will provide individuals with far more exposure to varied career options so they can better choose an employment goal meeting their preferences. This will help us equip those seeking community employment with better chances for success on the job when they do get hired.

KSI is also readying for re-entry into provided Supported Employment (SE) services to

help our participants find, apply for, train, and thrive in community employment. KSI's history as an SE provider was exemplary prior to the State's reduction of its rate for those services. Auditors examining KSI's SE services repeatedly cited that we didn't just prepare people for jobs—we prepared them for careers. We want to ensure that the participants who put amazing personal effort into preparing for the workforce also have the ongoing support from KSI to put that preparation to use for their employment success.

Overall, it's more than encouraging to see where KSI has come in the past year and exciting to understand where it's going. We encourage any of you to schedule your own tour of the Milford Skill Development Center, either individually or as a group. The best way to get inspired by our participants and what they are accomplishing in their lives is to see it firsthand. Sussex County Grants Funds to Extend KSI Music Program

In December, Sussex County Council granted KSI \$1,500 to extend the music program currently enriching participants' lives in Milford to KSI's Southern Campus in Georgetown. The grant will offer the Southern Campus the Music School of Delaware's "Music for All" program. It provides interactive experiences to help individuals access creative skills and benefit from the physical and emotional power of music. At the Milford Skill

Development Center, The Music School of Delaware has been providing varied experiences monthly to engage participants in the power of music. Music Therapist Kelsey Oldland offers weekly "Buckets & Boomwhackers" sessions incorporat-

ing rhythmic exercises with 5-gallon bucket drums. Within those sessions, she's included creative projects like having participants make their own percussion instruments. It's been extremely popular with participants and has included individuals who drove up from the Southern Campus to be part of it.

In addition to the weekly sessions, Music School of Delaware

faculty from the Milford and Wilmington locations have brought their talents and expertise to both entertain and educate in music. On November 21, consummate opera soloist and theater performer Jonathan Fox Powers gave a wonderful performance and helped participants find their voices. On December 9, cellist Eva Delgallo and violinist Diane Neutzling played holiday favorites and gave participants hands-on experience playing stringed instruments.

Thanks to Sussex County Council for helping us make this benefit more inclusive to the most participants possible.
