A Message from KSI's CEO Heath B. Chasanov

Coming into this holiday season, we have a lot for which to be thankful. We're very excited about the latest continuation of our renovation plan for the Milford Skill

Development Center. Providing a quality space in which participants can focus and creating a new center for Life Skills training are both exceptional additions to our programming space. (You can learn more in the article on page 3.)

Participant numbers have been consistently increasing throughout this past year. The renovations were greatly needed to fully serve individuals seeking quality training and experiences for making better lives. The growth in service demand plays up the necessity for completing renovations on the northern half of KSI's Milford facility to better accommodate more participants. That will require a larger fundraising campaign in the coming year.

Concerning funding for KSI's programs, we continue to monitor funding decisions on state and federal levels. Looking at budget shortfalls on the local level and federal funding cuts to Medicaid that will commence next year, all Delaware disability providers are concerned about sustainability moving forward. It's clear that the responsibility for continuing services for people with varied abilities is shifting from a governmental level to the public sector and the very communities in which individuals are being served. Your growing support as KSI's sustainers with your generous donations and sponsorships will make the difference in providing quality programs and services that the hundreds of people depending on us deserve.

We had a very successful KSI Clifford T. Crouch Memorial 3 Club Golf Tournament. Thanks goes to the nearly 100 players that came out September 5. Thanks also goes to the generous sponsors who made the tournament possible. In partnership, they helped raise nearly \$20,000 for KSI's programming. (See page 8 for the full story.)

Renovation of Milford Center Continues

On October 16, KSI hosted a crowd of legislators and community partners to showcase the latest continuation of its Milford Skill Development Center renovation. Attendees toured the new Pre-Vocational Training center, designed to better engage participants in training

and personal activities when they are not involved in paid work. Far from the open, manufacturing environment for which the Milford center has been known, this new training space joins the Life Enrichment Program area that was built in the southern wing of the Milford Center in the fall of 2023.

This latest chapter of a master renovation plan was completed this summer. It was funded through a \$500,000 ARPA grant administered through Kent County Levy Court. An additional \$100,000 was provided through the State of Delaware Community Reinvestment Fund as part of the "mini" Bond Bill. It included development of an additional Life Skills Training center that is outfitted with a working laundry set up, cooking and kitchen area,

dining tables, bed, and more. It will offer participants seeking more independent living the ability to practice the skills they need for daily life. The WSFS Cares Foundation donated \$10,000 to outfit the Life Skills

Training area with laundry and dryer machines, a refrigerator, and a stove to offer access to a true daily living experience. Plans are in the works to open the Life Skills facility to local schools to allow students transitioning into independent living the opportunity to learn needed skills if their schools did not have a

schools did not have a comparable training facility.

KSI has invested more than \$1.3 million dollars in renovating the Milford Skill Development Center so far. The latest continuation of the master renovation plan was constructed by Delaware City-based Amakor, Inc. Amakor has been operating since 1988, with extensive experience in commercial construction management. The project was designed by Davis, Bowen & Friedel's Milford office.

The organization is moving forward with plan development for

the remaining half of the Milford center's 72,000 total square feet. It will rework the northern end of the facility into a flex space that will accommodate both contract production and training space

Music School of Delaware is bringing a "Bucket and Boomwhackers" class to KSI as part of the school's Sweet Beats percussion program. The program uses buckets and other instruments for helping participants explore the personal benefits of rhythm. Music therapist Kelsey Oldman will lead KSI participants from both the Milford and Georgetown centers in a series of classes bringing various musical experiences.

Bucket bands are created by using five-gallon buckets and pairs of sticks. They offer participants hands-on musical exploration of rhythms from around the world. This class is not just about getting the rhythm in people's hands. It's also about getting the physical connection of rhythm throughout their entire bodies.

Thanks goes to Lowe's of Seaford which donated more than a dozen five-gallon buckets to make the class possible. The Music School of Delaware's class series at KSI is funded by a grant from the Lewes/Rehoboth Beach Rotary Club.
